<p>1b) What is my child learning at school? How can a parent review these materials?</p>	<p>In North Carolina, all schools use the same Standard Course of Study, determined by the State Board of Education. These standards are the knowledge and skills students should understand by the end of each grade/course.</p> <p>The standards can be found on the NCDPI Office of Academic Standards website. There are standards for Arts Education, Career Technical Education, Computer Science, English Language Arts, English Language Development, Student Success Standards, Healthful Living, Information and Technology, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies, and World Language. Local districts, schools and teachers determine how to teach these standards, including curriculum, supplementary materials, books, and other resources.</p>

	<p>ALA determines how to teach these standards, including what curriculum, supplementary materials, books, etc. is utilized.</p> <p>Ascend Leadership Academy also offers courses in the area of Career and Technical Education (CTE). These courses allow students to explore careers and earn credentials. <p>1c) How will a parent learn about my child’s progress in school or with a class?</p>	<p>Ascend Leadership Academy shares progress of students through a variety of ways, including quarterly report cards, progress reports, and assignment/test feedback.</p> <p>Information regarding assessments and the evaluation of student progress at Ascend Leadership Academy is available at the following link:</p> <p>W 24-25 ALA Student & Parent Handbook.docx</p> <p>Local Assessments: Quarterly report cards detailing grades and attendance are distributed, with specific quarter-end dates outlined in the school calendar. Parents can access attendance,</p>

	<p>grades, and testing information through the PowerSchool/Homebase parent portal using their login credentials. For assistance with PowerSchool access, parents can contact the school data manager.</p> <p>State Assessments: Individual Student Reports for end-of-grade/course tests and other state assessments (English language proficiency assessment) are sent home as a hard copy and electronically. All NC students take End-of-Grade assessments for reading and math in grades 3-8. Students take End-of-Grade science assessments in grades 5 and 8 . In the 8th Grade, if a student is enrolled in Math I, they will take the Math I End-of-Course assessment. High school students take end-of-course assessments in English II, Biology, NC Math 1, and NC Math 3. Grade 10 students take the Pre-ACT, grade 11 students take the ACT, and grade 12 CTE Concentrators take ACT WorkKeys, with results shared by ACT.</p> <p>Parents can find assessment information regarding the schedule, grade level, and purpose on our website at NC State Testing .</p>
<p>1d) What are the qualifications of my child’s teachers?</p>	<p>Parents of students have the right to know the professional qualifications of our ALA teachers. Parents can ask for certain information about their child’s classroom teachers, and ALA will give this information to parents in a timely manner if they ask for it.</p> <p>Parents may look up your child’s teacher licensure status at this website Link to the licensure website.</p> <p>The licensure look up webpage does not include current employment information. Parents may need additional information (i.e., middle name or license number) to identify the teacher accurately. Substitute teachers (either short or long term) may not hold a NC teaching license.</p>

Health issues that affect learning are addressed. <p>State law requires that every child entering public schools in N.C. for the first time or entering Kindergarten for the first time receive a health assessment. The NC Health Assessment is typically done when a student is preparing to enter Kindergarten. The assessment must occur within 12 months prior to entering school. The medical provider, parent or guardian must provide a completed health assessment transmittal form to the school on or before the child's first day of attendance. RAISE stands for Respect, Accountability, Integrity, Service and Excellence. Middle School students participate in daily lessons related to one of these values and High School students participate weekly in an hour long session. Teachers and other school staff develop the curriculum to engulf students with knowledge related to these values. - Review progress reports and report cards with your child. Set goals with your child.
- Communicate with your child's teacher about his/her progress and upcoming events.
- Monitor homework by ensuring your child completes his/her homework and it is turned in on time.
- Talk to your child about his/her school experience. Indicate to your child that you expect school to be a positive experience.
- Encourage daily reading by providing opportunities for your child to read both fiction and non-fiction books and articles.

<p>3) What services are available for parents and their children?</p>	<p>Open House: Ascend Leadership Academy's Open House is an opportunity for prospective families to explore our campus, meet our dedicated teachers and staff, and learn about our innovative programs. Families get a firsthand look at our classrooms, discover our approach to Project-Based Learning, and hear about the extracurricular activities and leadership opportunities we offer.</p> <p>Meet the Teacher/Curriculum Night: JAscend Leadership Academy's Curriculum/Meet the Teacher Night is where parents and students can connect with teachers, explore classroom expectations, and gain insight into the curriculum for the school year in each of their child’s classes. This event offers a chance to learn about key projects, assignments, and the support systems in place to help students succeed. It’s a great opportunity to ask questions, build relationships, and understand how parents and teachers work together to empower students academically and personally.</p> <p>1st and 3rd Quarter Exhibition Day Events: Ascend Leadership Academy's Project Based Learning (PBL) Exhibition Day is a showcase of student innovation, creativity, and critical</p>

During this event, students present the projects they've worked on throughout the semester, demonstrating their ability to solve real-world problems through research, collaboration, and hands-on learning. Families and community members are invited to explore these dynamic presentations, interact with students, and celebrate their hard work and achievements. Exhibition Day highlights the deep learning and practical skills our students develop through PBL, preparing them for success beyond the classroom.</p> <p>Parent/Teacher conferences: ALA encourages the involvement of parents in their child's education. If a parent/guardian has a concern regarding their child, they are asked to first contact the child's teacher. As a parent/guardian, they may request a conference with the teacher at any time. Arrangements should be made directly with the child's teacher. If they feel that the situation has not been handled appropriately by the teacher or if the parent still has concerns, then the parent may contact the Principal.</p> <p>Tutoring: NCVPS EdVantage Tutoring offers virtual statewide wraparound support to middle and high school students in NC public schools. Tutoring is available in Math, Science and ELA, and is offered via a personalized partnership with district/school leadership to best meet the needs of selected students each semester.</p>

Career and College Promise (CCP):

Ascend Leadership Academy partners with Central Carolina Community College to offer dual enrollment opportunities through the CCP program. If your high school student qualifies, students may earn high school credit by completing community college coursework. CCP courses may be taken in the College Transfer or Career and Technical Education pathway. These courses count for both high school and college credit. Tuition is free for families.

Advanced Placement (AP) Courses:

Advanced Placement (AP) is a program developed by the College Board to offer college-level curricula and examinations to high school students.

In NC, 40 Advanced Placement courses are offered in public high schools. Ascend Leadership Academy offers 8 AP courses to high school students.

Several AP courses satisfy graduation requirements for NC students as outlined in State Board policy.

Colleges and universities may likely offer college credit for these courses if your child

	<p>scores a 3 or above on the exam. Founded in 2007, with a strong commitment to ensuring quality education for all students, regardless of location, NCVPS has over 16 years of experience serving diverse Learners. Students may enroll in NCVPS courses for a variety of reasons. Work with your school counselor if you are interested in taking an NCVPS courses. What is a NC Charter School?</p> <p>Other Charter Schools Charter schools are public schools of choice that are authorized by the State Board of Education and operated by independent non-profit boards of directors. State and local tax dollars are the primary funding sources for charter schools, which have open enrollment and cannot discriminate in admissions, associate with any religion or religious group, or charge-tuition. Charter schools operate with freedom from many of the regulations that govern district schools, but charter schools are held accountable through the State assessment and accountability system.</p> <p>If you are interested in NC charter schools, visit NC charter school for information, resources,</p>
